

## DIRECTIONS

### BY CAR:

From the East, travel by Interstate 64 to Huntington, WV. Leave I-64 on Exit 15, 29<sup>th</sup> Street (Route 60) and keep right at the fork in the ramp and proceed West on Rt. 60, which turns into 31<sup>st</sup> street. Travel 3.4 miles to 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue and turn left onto Third Avenue. Travel two blocks and turn right on 29<sup>th</sup> Street. You'll see St. Mary's Hospital in front of you. Follow the directions to the parking garage. The Cardiology offices are located on the first floor (Suite 100) in the Highlawn Medical Building, which is in between the parking garage and St. Mary's Hospital.

From the West, travel Interstate 64 to Huntington, WV. Leave I-64 at Exit 15, 29<sup>th</sup> Street Exit, and turn onto Route 60 West and follow the directions above to the Highlawn Medical Building.

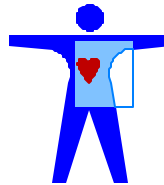
From the South, Huntington can be reached either by Interstate 77, also known as the West Virginia Turnpike, which joins I-64 at Beckley, WV. Proceed on I-64 West until Huntington. At exit 15 on I-64, leave I-64 and follow the directions above.

From the East and North, Huntington can be reached by I-77 or I-79, which join I-64 in Charleston, WV. Proceed west on I-64 until exit 15. Follow the directions in paragraph one.

### BY AIR:

Huntington Tri-State Airport is located 20 minutes away. Taxis service is available and should cost about \$15.00 to travel from the airport.

The Marshall University School of Medicine Adult Cardiology Fellowship Program is a clinically oriented three-year program that fulfills the requirements as recommended by the Core Cardiology Training Symposium of the American College of Cardiology. Each year we participate through the subspecialty matching program and intend to match three Fellows.

The medical school utilizes a combined clinical facility of a thousand beds encompassing two private hospitals and a Veteran's Administration Medical Center.

The Faculty in the Division of Cardiovascular Medicine have diverse research interests involving therapy of transient myocardial ischemia, nuclear diagnostic techniques, transesophageal echocardiography, and angioplasty. New areas of interest are in epidemiology and preventive cardiology, women's heart disease, acute coronary syndrome, genetics of cardiovascular disease, and cardiac effects of hemochromatosis utilizing quantitative coronary angiography and risk factor modification. The Cardiovascular medicine and surgical programs of Marshall University have assumed a leadership role in the community.

Our goal is to develop clinical cardiologists prepared to function as proper consultants, and develop skills in research design and critical literature review. Publication of completed original research is required. Opportunities are provided for basic science bench research or original clinical protocols.

Completed applications, which should also include your curriculum vitae, personal statement, three letters of recommendation, USMLE Steps 1,2 & 3 scores, ECFMG certificate (if applicable), med school diploma, and a photo will be accepted for 2006 Fellowship positions until February 1, 2005, should be mailed to the address listed on the front of the application. Upon review, selected candidates will be notified by email or phone for personal interview by faculty members.

### **About Huntington, West Virginia**

Huntington is a delightful community on the Ohio River where three states meet, West Virginia, Kentucky and Ohio. Its climate is nearly ideal, with average July temperatures of 75° to 80° and January temperatures of 35° to 40°. The winters are short, usually three months

Huntington is the largest city in West Virginia and serves a metropolitan area of approximately 300,000 people. Despite its growth, Huntington continues to preserve the small town advantages of low crime rates, relaxed life style, and quick access to rural and recreational areas.

The downtown shopping is enjoying a successful revitalization program, a multi-function Civic Center, Harris Riverfront Park, and numerous unique restaurants. Adjacent to the main retail section is Heritage Village, a specialty shopping area, centered around a restored railroad depot and highlighted by a turn of the century restaurant and bar. Approximately 15 minutes east of Huntington via Interstate 64 is the large enclosed Huntington Mall with four major department stores and more than one hundred specialty shops and restaurants. Indoor tennis courts are near to the mall.

Only a few blocks from the downtown area is Ritter Park, 150 acres of land set aside for informal, quiet recreation. The Park has one of the nation's most beautiful rose gardens, a natural open-air amphitheater for summertime musical and dramatic productions, and jogging and bicycle paths meandering along the streams and roadways. Nestled in the hills above the Park is the Huntington Museum of Art, a museum housing a large permanent collection of paintings, prints, sculpture, glass, drawings, weavings and ceramics. It is the site of several major exhibitions annually.

The City has a theater group, several choral groups, a Chamber orchestra, pops orchestra, and a symphonic band. Marshall University also offers an Artist Series each year featuring outstanding musical and theatrical performers of national and international reputation.

Huntington prides itself on its wide tree-lined streets and well kept residential areas, abundance of park land and recreational facilities, a variety of churches, and a cordial atmosphere. Its public schools are excellent and organized by neighborhood.
